What is the Self-Sufficiency Standard?

 Measures how much a family of a certain composition in a given geographic location needs to meet their basic needs without government or private subsides.


• The Standard is calculated for 70 family types in each of Indiana's 92 counties.


Self-Sufficiency Standard vs. Federal Poverty Guidelines

<u>Self-Sufficiency</u> <u>Standard</u>

- Cost of basic needs based on local costs
- County specific
- Assumes all adults are working full-time
- Adjusts by family size and composition
- Includes taxes and tax credits

Federal Poverty Guidelines

- Based solely on food costs
- Does not take into account geographic location
- Assumes one parent stays at home and the other is working
- Adds flat rate per extra person (\$3,740 in 2009)
- Taxes not included




Minimum Wage vs. Self-Sufficiency Wage


